It has been said that when one door closes another opens. With the retirement of Betty and John, Carol Doherty stepped in as our manager and host. Donnie Potter took over as our caretaker and groundskeeper. Both have proven invaluable – a dream team of creativity, commitment and good cheer.

Carol brings with her a freshness and vision which is swiftly taking the Point to new heights. Flower gardens are sprouting on the grounds, conifers are being planted along Route 28, the lawn now extends in front of the Lodge, and green grass grows where once gray gravel reigned. The

cottages are at last being decorated – an ongoing project. Our winter and spring seasons will abound with murder mystery weekends, romantic getaways, and snowshoeing weekends. Carol’s enthusiasm, quick wit, and creativity, and Donnie’s steady and gifted hand, promise to make Prospect Point a unique and memorable experience for all of us to enjoy.

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would be in danger of collapse. Our projections as to the time and cost of repairing the cottages were incredibly underestimated. The renovations we naively imagined would be completed in 6 months have taken almost a decade, and we're still not done. Except for the friends we remained in touch with, we had no guest list, and there were days we really didn't know what would happen to our venture.

At that time we would have been happy to initially achieve a 70% occupancy rate. The website built by our son, Paul, helped spread the word that Prospect Point was back, and to our amazement and delight, we swiftly managed to achieve almost full occupancy. So while we greatly underestimated the time and cost of repairs, we also underestimated the occupancy the Point would enjoy. We were wrong on everything, but fortunate that to a certain extent they balanced each other out. How's that for good planning!

In the years that followed, a Lodge arose where the old office once stood, and the new Library/Conference Room became the Point's very heart; hosting talent shows, movie nights, parties and get-togethers. While we've tried to preserve the feel of the old green and white cottages on the outside, the interiors renovated by Bob Curry and Ken Bennett – many with skylights, cathedral ceilings and fireplaces – are second to none. Walking around the Point these days, it seems to us a long way from those earlier times, but somehow we feel connected and attached to those days too. We can never express the joy we feel wandering around the Point and seeing so many happy faces. The heartfelt letters we receive telling us what a wonderful experience and vacation some of you have had fill us with pride and make it all seem even more worthwhile.

My family and I look forward to improving the Point. We're confident that with Carol's boundless enthusiasm and the help of our excellent staff, we will have a Prospect Point that
